Javaad Alipoor is a British-Iranian, Manchester-based and Bradford-built artist,

writer and founding Artistic Director of The Javaad Alipoor Company. The Javaad Alipoor Company takes stories beyond the stage through powerful multi-platform creations that explore the intersection of politics and technology in the contemporary world. Javaad was Resident Associate Director at Sheffield Theatres (2017-18), Associate Director at Bradford's Theatre in the Mill (2015-2017) and is an alumni of Arts Council England's Change Makers programme. Javaad's plays include The Believers Are But Brothers, Rich Kids: A History of Shopping Malls in Tehran (both published by Oberon) and Made of Mannheim, and his writing on international politics, cultural policy and art has been featured in The Guardian, The Independent and The Stage.



NATALIE DIDDAMS Dramaturg

Natalie Diddams is a dramaturg, director and academic researcher based in the UK. Notable

productions include A Series of Metaphors About a Plague (Home Manchester), The Believers Are But Brothers (International Tour), B!RTH (Royal Exchange Theatre), and Thesmo (National Tour). Natalie is a Teaching Fellow at Manchester Metropolitan University and University of Warwick. Bolotin co-founded and codirected the New York art-technology organisation Hyphen Hub and was appointed the Arts Co-Director for New York City's inaugural Creative Tech. 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
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RIVERSIDE'S NATIONAL THEATRE OF PARRAMATTA

Riverside's National Theatre of Parramatta (NTofP) launched in November 2015 reflects the diversity of contemporary Australia. As the producing arm of Riverside Theatres we are *Putting the Nation on Stage* – raising the profile of performance and showcasing imaginative and creative ideas both in form and content.

NTofP presents bold, contemporary works, aiming to engage and take our audiences on inspirational and transformative journeys.

As a leading Western Sydney arts organisation NTofP contributes to Sydney's vibrant artistic community by fostering the creation of new works, building capacity in the arts by nurturing artists and producing works that resonate both locally and beyond.

THE JAVAAD ALIPOOR COMPANY

The Javaad Alipoor Company (JAC) seeks to make theatre compelling to audiences who are culturally engaged but don't see theatre as relevant to their lives. The company explores subjects that challenge expectations and provoke critical thinking. The work is always political, pushes the boundaries of the form, and focuses on 'liveness' and the power of story to change perceptions.

Established in 2017, JAC stands on the shoulders of Northern Lines, the first company founded by Javaad Alipoor – a British-Iranian, Manchester-based and Bradford-built artist and writer – and retains its commitment to making new work with diverse artists for diverse audiences and communities. Originating from Bradford and now based in Manchester, the Company was set up as a community theatre project engaging with 4,000 participants over four years in some of the most ethnically diverse and deprived wards in Bradford. We have since toured work internationally, produced digital stage to screen adaptations seen by over 100,000 people and are addressing the lack of diversity in theatre through co-creation and partnership. The company is celebrated for its innovative, inclusive, high-quality work.

In 2017, Javaad began writing a trilogy of plays about how technology, resentment and fracturing identities are changing the world. *The Believers Are But Brothers* (2017) opened in Edinburgh where it won a Fringe First Award, before transferring to London's Bush Theatre. It has toured nationally and internationally, and in 2019 was commissioned for television by the BBC and The Space and adapted and produced by the Company as its first screen project. The play's sequel – *Rich Kids: A History of Shopping Malls in Tehran* (2019) – premiered at the Traverse Theatre, winning a Fringe First Award. Its London transfer and subsequent national tour was postponed by Covid-19, inspiring the creation of a new digital version for online audiences. This new version was commissioned by Battersea Arts Centre and Norfolk & Norwich Festival and has been shown by a wide range of national and international partners.
